




Life in the Great Ice Age by Michael & Beverly Oard (YOUTH NON FIC OAR). After Noah's Flood the earth and its climate were undergoing drastic changes. The stage had been set for the Great Ice Age. Noah's descendants had to learn how to survive in a strange often hostile land. In part one of the *Life in the Great Ice Age*, we'll spend a summer with Jabeth and his family as they survive a saber-toothed tiger attack, battle a cave bear, and go on a woolly mammoth hunt. Part two explains the scientific reasons for the Ice Age: what caused it, and how long it lasted. It answers the question, "Will there be another Ice Age?" Archaeological and fossil finds are also discussed in detail in this exciting book that explains the Great Ice Age from a Biblical perspective.

A Vision for Missions by Tom Wells (266 WEL). Foreign Missionary endeavour sometimes appears hesitant, even half-hearted, before the problems of this age. Poverty and famine, national religious and cultural issues, and above all the weakness of the 'Christian' West, have thrown doubt on the work of missions as it was once understood. Tom Wells writes with the conviction that Christians must come back to first principles. Human need and world conditions are not the starting point. The Gospel is a call to know and worship God, and the primary conviction of the messenger must be that God is worthy to be known. The missionary vision must begin with the vision of God. Only then can the Church truly respond to the command to 'declare His glory among the nations.'







The story of the church is important for Christians to know, for it contains rich and uplifting stories of God's dealings with His people. In this book, Dr. Ferguson takes the reader on a tour of Christian history, featuring stories and songs to give believers a sense of their place in God's kingdom and to encourage them in their walk.

When God Weeps – *Why Our Sufferings Matter to the Almighty* by Joni Eareckson Tada & Steven Estes. If God is loving, why is there suffering? What's the difference between permitting something and ordaining it? When bad things happen, who's behind them – God or the devil? When suffering touches our lives, questions like these suddenly demand an answer. From our perspective, suffering doesn't make sense, especially when we believe in a loving and just God. After more than thirty years in a wheelchair, Joni Eareckson Tada's intimate experience with suffering gives her a special understanding of God's intentions for us in our pain, in *When God Weeps*, she and lifelong friend Steven Estes probe beyond glib answers that fail us in our time of deepest need. Instead, with firmness and compassion, they reveal a God big enough to understand our suffering, wise enough to allow it and powerful enough to use it for a greater good than we can ever imagine.
